Cold Moon by Jeffret Deaver Deaver's seventh Lincoln Rhyme novel pits Rhyme, the quadriplegic NYPD detective,



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Online Resource of the Month—Automotive Repair Reference Center & NoveList

Two brand new databases have been added this month: Automotive Repair Reference Center and Novelist.



Auto Repair

Attention mechanics! (and dabblers in car repair as well!)...know those great books in the library that help with just about everything you need to know to repair your vehicle? Here's a resource you won't want to miss! The Auto Repair Reference Center contains information on most major manufacturers of domestic and imported vehicles, with repair information for most vintage makes starting as far back as 1945. Database content includes approximately 26,000 vehicles covered from 1945 to present; over 150,000 factory drawings and step-by-step photographs; approximately 70,000 technical service bulletins & recalls issued by the original equipment vehicle manufacturer; over 100,000 enhanced wiring diagrams for easy viewing and printing; specifi-

cations & maintenance schedules; Labor Time Guide & Estimator; and even a complete guide to vehicle ownership & maintenance. All of the content has been created by ASE certified technicians.



Finally, something for fiction lovers! At Novelist you'll find Author Read-alikes, What We're Reading, Book Discussion Guides, BookTalks, and Annotated Book Lists. NoveList allows readers to use a favorite author or title as a template to locate other authors and titles of interest. In addition to finding similar books to your favorites, NoveList allows you to look up and view series information, search

for books by entering your own descriptive terms, browse book lists by category, genre, or theme at every reading level, and look for award-winning titles. This is a great resource to help readers discover new authors and find books that match their preferred reading styles.

Reading...the Sport of Champions!

It's time to come sign up for Summer Reading Fun! Each year, the Fort Stockton Public Library conducts Summer Reading Clubs for all ages. All of the Summer Reading events at the library are completely free of charge to the entire community.

Children, from birth through grade 5, participate in the **Texas Summer Reading Club**, a program of the Texas State Library. The Summer Reading Program at the public library helps young readers maintain their reading level over the summer break from school and encourages students to read as an important and fun summer activity. It is designed to encourage youth to read for pleasure and to promote library usage. An average of 450 youth signing up each year and are required to read a minimum of 8 hours over the summer to be considered for prizes and the end-of-summer party.

Young Adults in grades 6 to 12 participate in YAWA – the **Young Adult Writer's and Artists Club**, where they explore different types of literature and art, and at the end of the summer publish their own magazine of original artwork, photographs, poetry, and short stories. Young adults must also read for 8 hours over the course of the program to be considered for prizes and to attend the end-of-summer party.

Adults who read a minimum of 5 hours are entered in weekly drawings for items and services donated by local businesses such as free oil changes, haircuts, and dinners for two at local restaurants. Adults may submit one entry for every 5 hours they read (limited to one per week). Adults who complete an optional **Library Bingo** card will be entered in a grand prize drawing. Bingo cards require participants to read various genres, including non-fiction.

Families may choose to complete the **Summer Reading Family Bingo** and be entered in a special drawing rewarding them for their commitment to a strong, healthy family. Family Bingo includes such activities as having parents read to the children, children read to the parents, and checking out specific items to review together, such as travel books about a place they would like to visit.
